



Begin your tour on Court Street, in front of (1) the Greene County Court House, built in 1838 (restored after a disastrous fire in 1979) and a fine example of the Greek Revival Court Houses for which Virginia is famous. (2) The Old County Jail, built 1838. (3) Stanardsville Methodist Church, built 1858. (4) Gibbons Market, built 1861. (5) Lafayette Hotel, built 1840. (6) Dicey's Cottage, built c.1840 as part of the hotel building complex, used as slave quarters. (7) Episcopal Rectory, built 1898. Continuing east along Main Street, and staying on the South side of the street, you will pass the town's newest building, the Library and Senior Center, opened in 2004. (8) Evergreene Country House, built c.1810. (9) Small brick building, built as an office c.1851. (10) The Duff House, built 1841, later modified in Queen Anne style. (11) The log-bodied Mitchell House, built 1845. (12) The first auto sales and service building in the town was built in 1930 as The Stanardsville Motor Company, and now housing Noonwhistle Pottery. (13) The terracotta-roofed Bickers-Whitlock house and out-buildings, built 1907. (14) The Carpenter Gothic African-American Shiloh Baptist Church, 1907, adjacent to Civil War era Ewell Cemetery and a Confederate Monument. (15) Sorrille family house and outbuildings, built 1850. (16) Red brick McMullen House, built 1858. (17) Page Jarrell House, a Queen Anne Victorian built in 1892, and behind it, Forest Hill Academy, built by F.M. McMullen on land he purchased in 1867. (18) Stanardsville Baptist Church, built 1928. (19) The Cole House, a Queen Anne Victorian built in 1913. (20) The oldest house still standing, built by John Sorrille c.1815, was possibly once used as a tollhouse for the turnpike over the mountains (Sorrille was home secretary to President Madison). (21) Another 'Painted Lady,' the C.G. Miller House, built c.1897. (22) The Pritchett Hume house, built 1848 with Victorian-era additions. (23) The Queen Anne B&B, built c.1901. (24) Now known as the IOOF building, the Price Store was built c.1820. (25) The Carpenter Gothic Grace Episcopal Church, built 1901. (26) The Moyer's House, built in 1917 on the home site of William Stanard, for whom our town is named.

Approaching Stanardsville from the West via Celt Road, you pass Stanardsville Cemetery on your right, the final resting place of many of the town's early residents and still in use today.
